

Chuppah Checklist

To efficiently and effectively get you married, it's best to clarify a number of things well in advance.

The Chuppah in a Nutshell

Basically, the rabbi recites the two Berachot of *Borei Peri HaGefen* and *Birkat Erusin*, both bride and groom take a drink, then the groom declares the canonical proposal ("*Harei At Mekudeshet Li...*") in Hebrew and puts the ring on the bride's finger. The Ketubah is read, and the rabbi may even share a Torah thought. Then, Sheva Berachot are recited, the glass is shattered, and the couple is danced out of the room.

The Ketubah:

The Ketubah is a written contract stating the groom's financial commitment to their marriage and his obligations to support his bride. The Ketubah is so crucial that our Chachamim went as far as prohibiting a married couple from living together without one, to guarantee the security of the wife. Therefore, one should ensure that his Ketubah is valid by recruiting a qualified rabbi to write it and fill it out. To avoid errors, sit down with your rabbi and let him fill it out in advance and bring a backup, too.

Some also read and have witnesses sign a marriage stipulation document (Tennaim) before the chuppah, and some appoint witnesses for the Badeken (veiling the bride) and Yichud room (post Chuppah seclusion). Keep in mind those who can't receive one of these honors are still eligible to sign the marriage license.

Sheva Berachot are also recited at the meal after Birkat HaMazon:

Those signing should make sure they know how to sign their names, as well.

The Wedding Ceremony

Kiddushin

Officiating rabbi recites the Berachot over a cup of wine:

Groom and bride take a sip of wine and then the groom declares to the bride:

The groom then puts the ring on her finger in front of two kosher witnesses. After which the rabbi declares the marriage successful:
